EPWORTH COVID UPDATE

With infections raging out of control Epworth has taken all the necessary precautions to remain open and allowing for in-person worship. We have continued to pivot to make the necessary changes to allow us to do ministry. Our groups and teams

are meeting using Zoom and some have even met together here at the church practicing all the measures to keep people safe. As you can see in this newsletter, we are being creative to help us stay connected and be in fellowship with one another.

Unfortunately, all reports and indicators show that the virus is out of control. Despite our best efforts I feel it necessary to suspend in-person worship effective November 29th. The decision comes with a heavy heart as we come into the Advent season. The risk is too great to those are attending and I am unwilling to take it.

COMMUNITY THANKSGIVING SERVICE

In the midst of this difficult year we can still be people of thanksgiving. Despite the



troubles we face, there are still blessings to be found. This year the Triboro Clergy Association of Palmyra, Cinnaminson and Riverton is creating an online Thanksgiving Service and also on DVD. The pandemic situation limits our gatherings even for worship. Rather than just cancelling the service, our area clergy are putting together a service that can be shared from the safety of our homes. The interfaith worship service will be available Tuesday, November 24 through our Facebook page and also a link will be sent out through email. We hope you will take time and share this special service with us.

NEW ADVENT DISCUSSION

THE CHRISMONS TREE

In 1957 Francis Kipps Spencer, wife of the pastor of the Lutheran Church of the Ascension in Danville, Virginia, wanted to decorate a Christmas tree for her church that would be more suitable for a sanctuary than traditional bright ornaments. Thinking of the tradition of decorating a birthday cake with candles and

the honoree's name, she began looking for something that would reflect the Christian faith. Mrs. Spence decided to place the name of Jesus and His title, Christ, on the tree using the Greek monograms and so "Chi Rho" became one of the earliest Chrismons, monograms for Christos, the Greek word for Christ. These simple monograms, some crosses, and clear lights decorated the first Chrismon tree. The tree itself symbolizes the eternal life Jesus Christ provides.

In following years, Frances Spence added other designs using signs and symbols used by early Christians (the fish), as well as designs that reference Jesus' life (the manger and cross), ministry (shepherd's staff), and leadership (Alpha and Omega). Chrismons are traditionally white and gold; white for purity, gold for majesty and glory. This tradition has spread to other denominations, including Anglican, Catholic, Methodist, and Reformed.

Our tree has more than 60 Chrismons (44 designs) handmade with love and care of white felt, cotton batting, gold thread and sequins, by a group of Epworth ladies nearly 60 years ago. Some time ago our MYF made Chrismons using white styrofoam, gold glitter and sequins. Unfortunately, we cannot find them. A live tree was used until 2003 when the present tree was purchased for safety and convenience.

There are 9 different styles of crosses on the tree. See if you can find them. Some of them can also be seen in our beautiful stained glass windows.

GOOD NEIGHBOR MINISTRY

Over a year ago Asbury UMC and Rev. John Doll began a ministry to help the homeless in our tri-boro area. Each month the Good Neighbor Program provides thousands of dollars in assistance to those who need a place stay. Sometimes it may be for a night and other times for a week. They have been blessed to have St. Vincent de Paul through St Charles come along side in this mission. We share this with you so you may the good work that is being done with our sister Methodist church. Working together we are feeding, clothing and sheltering those who are in need in our community. Frayer Shawl Ministry

Tangible evidence of the love and prayers of our congregation

Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? Isaiah 43:19

Shawls have been around for millennium and used in prayer by various faiths for centuries, but the *ministry* of shawls being created in prayer and given in love is very new. It was begun by a group of women who participated in the first Women's Leadership Institute at Hartford Seminary in Hartford, Connecticut, in 1998, 22 years ago. This ministry is now world-wide and is practiced by persons of various faiths and traditions.

Epworth's PSM began in 2005. In the beginning, shawls were made for Epworth's immediate church family, but soon we had requests for shawls for their relatives and friends and today we accept all requests for shawls. We also try to keep an eye and ear out for folks in the need of prayer and comfort. This is hard to do under the limitations imposed by the COVID pandemic and so we ask for your help in that.
